

Monica Fabio began serving as an administrative aide intern with the Human Resources Department's Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) division in November 2012. After completing her academic internship, she has continued to volunteer. Her efforts help both the Human Rights and Marin Women's commissions, which receive staff support from the EEO division. "I assisted with the annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Humanitarian Awards dinner, the Teen Girls Conference, and the Women and Money Conference," she said.

Monica applies her organizational skills to update commission websites, create flyers, keep guest lists, and collect ticket payments. She also assists during commission events, which engage and inform hundreds of community residents. She values the opportunity to "gain experience in a professional setting."

During her internship, she served 20 hours a month while earning college credit at Dominican University. She graduated in May with a bachelor's degree in psychology and plans to apply to graduate school next year. Monica said, "This past year I worked closely with one of my professors to create and conduct my first research project. This gave me the confidence to pursue graduate school. The hardest part of getting a PhD is writing a dissertation; the research experience was training in order to accomplish my goals."

A member of Psi Chi, an international honor society for psychology students, she was honored to present her senior thesis, "Burnout as It Relates to Degree of Life Satisfaction, Perceived Stress and Perceptions of Professional Success," at an academic showcase at Dominican. She also presented at the National Conference of Undergraduate Research at the University of Wisconsin and at the Western Psychological Association's annual conference in Reno, NV.

Her supervisor is EEO Senior Secretary Jaime Powell. "Monica is an invaluable volunteer," Jaime said. "Her assignment includes a wide variety of tasks. What makes Monica such an asset is that she is willing to learn anything. She isn't afraid to dive into any task, whether big or small. She is extremely bright yet never too proud to ask questions. Monica's dedication is evident and her continuous positive attitude is contagious. She is an amazing volunteer!"




It's time: Report your service hours online!


Civic Center volunteers and student interns who have signed up in our new software system may now report service hours directly to the system.

You must have created a User ID and password and filled in the mandatory fields AND our staff must have connected your profile to your current assignment(s). Colleen Fulkerson finds serenity in fire lookout duty

Volunteering atop Marin mountains provides Civic Center Volunteer **Colleen Fulkerson** a peaceful balance to her demanding career as a legal assistant. Since 2009, she has spent one weekend a month during fire season as a Marin County Fire Department lookout.

During a weekend volunteer shift,

Colleen watches for fire from a high perch. Lookout towers are on Mt. Tamalpais and Mt. Dixon. Using a special tool called an Osbourne Fire Finder, she constantly scans for smoke columns. Twice a day she checks the air temperature, wind direction, wind speed, and general conditions, then radios the information to the fire dispatch center at the Woodacre Fire Station.

"I have found peace and beauty on these weekends," said Colleen, who considers her mountaintop weekends a private retreat. During offduty hours, she washes the lookout windows, reads, listens to classical music, and hikes the mountaintop. She stays in contact with her supervisor, Fire Engineer **Don Keylon**, via phone and e-mail. "Colleen does her job plus a little

more," said Don, who coordinates the lookout team. "She leads the way and raises the bar."

Colleen lives in Antioch. She has seven children -- and 12 grandchildren, ages 3 through 17.

Growing up in Idaho, Colleen hiked and camped with her family. "I saw fire towers there and was always fascinated by them," she said. "When I saw the volunteer lookout opportunity online, it seemed a natural fit." She has visited Peru, India, and Nepal and looks forward to more travel with her significant other, Wendell Pells. They love the outdoors and most recently hiked in Zion National Park. Her favorite hike continues to be a spot in the Yellowstone back country.
