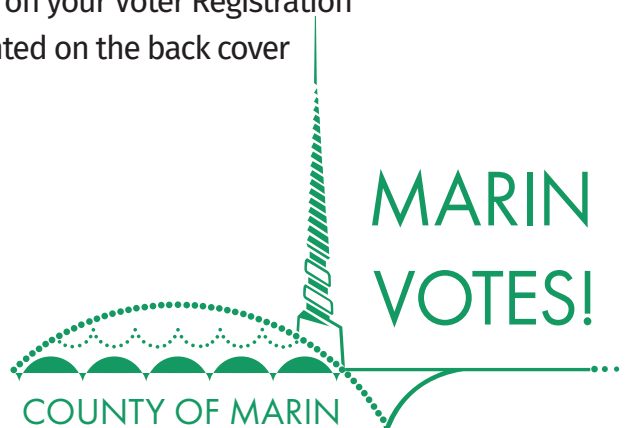

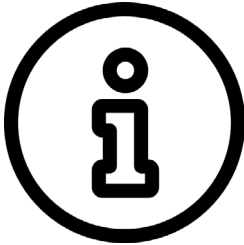

- **To express your preference for a candidate for nomination for President,** completely fill in the oval to the left of the candidate's name, like this . Your vote in this portion of the ballot is advisory only.
- **To vote for a candidate,** fill in the oval to the left of the candidate's name, like this .
- **To vote for only the number of candidates allowed for each office.**
- **To vote for a qualified write-in candidate,** fill in the oval to the left of the blank line for that office and write the name of the person on the line. (Qualified means a person who has filed to be a write-in candidate.)
- **To vote on a proposition or measure,** fill in the oval to the left of **YES** or **NO**, like this .
- **If you make a mistake** or damage your ballot, ask an election worker for another ballot. Vote by mail voters call the Elections Office at 415-473-6456 for instructions.
- **Keep your vote secret. Do not sign or initial your ballot. Do not mark your ballot outside of the ovals.**

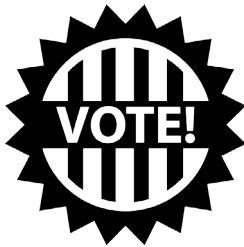
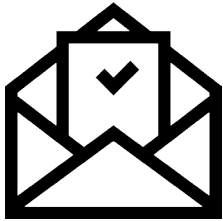

MEASURE A

This Measure was placed on the ballot by the Board of Trustees of the Tamalpais Union High School District.

Pursuant to Article XIII A (1)(b)(3) of the California Constitution, if this measure is approved by 55% of the votes cast, the Tamalpais Union High School District will be authorized to incur bonded indebtedness in multiple series of up to five hundred seventeen million dollars (\$517,000,000) with an interest rate not to exceed the limit set by law.

Money raised by bond sales may only be used for the purposes and projects stated in the Bond Project List set forth in Measure A. These purposes and projects include replacing and upgrading classroom buildings at Tamalpais and Redwood High Schools, repairing roofs, painting exteriors, repairing and/or replacing restrooms, upgrading technology infrastructure, as well as replacing portable classrooms. As required by law, Measure A prohibits using bond proceeds for teacher and administrator salaries or other operating expenses.

The District estimates the average projected tax rate necessary to fund the bonds will be 3 cents per \$100 of taxable value (\$30 per \$100,000 of assessed value) while the bonds are outstanding. This estimate is a projection, and could go up or down, depending on a number of factors including the timing and amount of bond sales, and changes in assessed property values in the District. If all the bonds are sold, the District estimates total debt service (including the principal and interest) will be approximately \$1,040,000,000. If the bond issuance is authorized, it will commence in fiscal year 2024-25 and the final fiscal year in which it is anticipated that the revenue will be collected is 2052-53.

The Measure requires annual independent financial audits and spending review by an independent citizens' oversight committee.

TAX RATE STATEMENT

An election will be held within the boundaries of Tamalpais Union High School District (“District”) on March 5, 2024 to authorize the sale of up to \$517 million in bonds to finance facilities as described in the measure. If the bonds are approved, the District expects to sell the bonds in multiple series. Principal and interest on the bonds will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property located within the District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400 to 9404, inclusive, of the California Elections Code.

1. The best estimate from official sources of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on assessed valuations available at the time of the election, a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction and other demonstrable factors, is estimated to be \$30 per \$100,000 (3 cents per \$100) of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is 2052-53.

2. The best estimate from official sources of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction and other demonstrable factors, is estimated to be \$30 per \$100,000 (3 cents per \$100) of assessed valuation first occurring in fiscal year 2024-25.

3. The best estimate from official sources of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is \$1.04 billion.

Voters should note that the estimated tax rate is based on the ASSESSED VALUE of taxable property on the Marin County official tax rolls, not on the property’s market value. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills to determine their property’s assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon the District’s projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District. The actual tax rates, debt service and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on need for construction funds and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

The opponents' argument is misleading and ignores important **FACTS:**

FACT: Aging high schools need urgent repairs. Classrooms and labs have leaky roofs, deteriorating plumbing, outdated electrical systems and poor access for students with disabilities. Upgrades will protect student safety, support teachers and enhance quality academics. Waiting only makes upgrades more expensive.

FACT: Measure A results from a transparent, community-driven process. For two years Tamalpais Union High School District meticulously evaluated each of its five schools and conducted 39 community meetings to collect priorities from teachers, parents and the community. FULL TEXT OF MEASURE A

TAMALPAIS UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND MEASURE

By approval of this measure by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the registered voters voting thereon, the Tamalpais Union High School District (“District”) shall be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$517,000,000 in aggregate principal amount to provide financing for the specific school facilities projects listed below in the Bond Project List, subject to all of the accountability safeguards specified herein.

SECTION I: KEY FINDINGS

- Tam High, Redwood, Archie Williams, San Andreas and Tamiscal High Schools consistently rank among the best high schools in the state and the nation.
- The approximately 5,000 students in the District perform well above state and national averages.
- Many District graduates are accepted into top colleges and universities around the country.
- However, with Tam High over 100 years old and Redwood and Archie Williams over 60 years old, District high schools are aging and in need of repair.
- To identify facility needs at each District school site and to prioritize improvements based on urgency and importance, the District performed a thorough assessment of all facilities by architects and school construction experts.
- Along with this assessment, District staff collected and analyzed feedback from more than 775 school and community stakeholders.
- Taken together, this outreach formed the basis of the District’s Facilities Master Plan, drafted during the Spring of 2022.
- Additional funds are needed to begin addressing the most urgent needs identified in the Facilities Master Plan, such as:
 - Repair and replacement of aging and leaking roofs;
 - Repair and replacement of outdated and inefficient heating, cooling, electrical and plumbing systems;
 - Improvements to classroom, science lab, technology and infrastructure at all District campuses;
 - Updates to technology and equipment for classrooms, science and computer labs;
 - Updates to career and job training classrooms for current educational standards;
 - Updates to art, music and performing arts classrooms; and
 - Replacement of outdated, aging and deteriorating temporary portable classrooms;
- The state does not provide funding for facility improvements, so local schools cannot maintain modern facilities, infrastructure and technology without a local funding source.
- The Board of Trustees believes that locally controlled funding from a school facilities improvement bond measure are needed to fund identified upgrades and

repairs at local high schools.

- Proceeds from a voter-approved school facilities improvement bond measure would be controlled locally for District high schools only and could not be taken away by the State.
- None of the money raised would be used for administrators’ salaries or pensions or other school operating expenses.

An independent citizens’ oversight committee, mandatory annual audits and public disclosure of all spending will help ensure funds are spent as intended.

SECTION II: ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES

The provisions in this section are included in this proposition in order that the voters and taxpayers of the District may be assured that their money will be spent to address specific facilities needs of the District, all in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, section 1(b)(3) of the State Constitution, and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Section 15264 et seq. of the California Education Code).

Evaluation of Needs. The Board of Trustees has evaluated the facilities needs of the District and has identified projects to finance from a local bond measure at this time. The Board of Trustees has certified that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List.

Independent Citizens’ Oversight Committee. The Board of Trustees shall establish an independent Citizens’ Oversight Committee in accordance with Education Code sections 15278-15282 and applicable Board policy, to ensure bond proceeds are expended only for the school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List. The committee shall be established within sixty (60) days of the date when the Board of Education enters the results of the election in its official minutes.

Annual Performance Audit. The Board of Trustees shall conduct or cause to be conducted an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects described in the Bond Project List.

Annual Financial Audit. The Board of Trustees shall conduct or cause to be conducted an annual, independent financial audit of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent.

Annual Report to Board. Upon approval of this measure and the sale of any bonds approved, the Board of Trustees shall take actions necessary to establish an account in which proceeds of the sale of bonds will be deposited. As long as any proceeds of the bonds remain unexpended, the Superintendent shall cause a report to be filed with the Board of Trustees no later than January 1 of each year, commencing on the first January 1 after bonds have been issued and proceeds spent, stating (1) the amount of bond proceeds received and expended in the past fiscal year, and (2) the status of any project funded or to be funded from bond proceeds. The report may be incorporated into the annual budget, annual financial report, or other appropriate routine report to the Board.

SECTION III: BOND PROJECT LIST

This Bond Project List, which is an integral part of this proposition, describes the specific projects the District proposes to finance with proceeds of the bonds. All information contained within this “Section III: Bond Project List” comprises the list and description of permissible projects and expenses that may be paid from bond proceeds.

In order to meet all identified facility needs, the District intends to complete projects using a combination of funding sources, including joint use funds or contributions, development impact fees, and state funding (if available). The District will pursue state matching funds if and when they become available, and if received, they will be used for projects on the Bond Project List or other high priority capital outlay expenditures as permitted by law. Approval of this measure does not guarantee that all projects on this Bond Project List at all listed sites will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by this measure. The District’s proposal for the projects assumes the receipt of some state matching funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure. Bond funds may be used to meet any matching share contribution requirements.

Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this measure shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, replacement, furnishing and equipping of school facilities on the Bond Project List. Projects listed below may be completed at any and all properties, school sites and facilities where such project is determined necessary, and projects are authorized to be performed at each and all of the District’s high schools and the adult school, and administrative and ancillary support facilities, whether owned, leased or yet to be acquired, including, without limitation, the following school sites and properties:

Archie Williams High School
Redwood High School
San Andreas High School
Tamalpais High School
Tamiscal High School

Specific projects to be funded by the bond measure include the following:

A. COMPLETE BASIC REPAIRS, RENOVATIONS AND SYSTEM UPGRADES

- Replace and upgrade outdated classroom buildings at Tamalpais and Redwood High Schools;
- Replace and/or upgrade outdated portable buildings on school campuses, including, without limitation, at replacement of portable buildings at Tamiscal High School with new modular buildings; remove unused, outdated portable buildings from school campuses;
- Replace deteriorating and leaky roofs;
- Repaint school exteriors and interiors and refresh or replace trees and landscaping;
- Repair and replace aging student restrooms, including gender neutral toilet modernization, reconfiguration, and additions;
- Improve technology infrastructure to increase bandwidth

Districtwide and enhance network-based content and curriculum delivery; provide updated classroom audio/visual technology for content delivery and presentation (which may include projectors and/or large format flat-screen monitors and sound and voice amplification systems); Acquire and/or improve classroom technology, upgrade backbone systems wireless access points, switches, and MDF/IDF data rooms with environmental controls.

B. PROVIDE STUDENT HEALTH/SAFETY UPGRADES AND ENERGY/RESOURCE EFFICIENCY IMPROVEMENTS

- Repair/replace leaking water and irrigation lines and valves to improve water efficiency;
- Modernize plumbing, heating and cooling systems to reduce carbon footprint, conserve water, reduce wastewater and improve student learning environments;
- Repair/replace outdated electrical switchgear to improve resilience and safety;
- Repair/modernize fire and life safety systems including alarms, elevators and fire exits;
- Upgrade restrooms and path of travel to improve access for students with disabilities and meet current Americans with Disabilities Act requirements;
- Improve security at schools by providing wayfinding, signage, fire and classroom intrusion alarms, public address and emergency communication systems, safety locks on classroom doors, campus access control systems and exterior lighting for student safety;
- Provide solar photovoltaic parking structures and electric vehicle charging stations to offset energy usage, reduce carbon footprint and promote sustainable practices;
- Provide solar water heaters to reduce energy consumption and improve sustainability;
- Expand/reconfigure student services spaces to enhance student wellness;
- Improve vehicle and bicycle parking lots and drop-off areas to enhance student safety and improve traffic circulation; resurface asphalt parking areas;
- Expand storage for emergency supplies;
- Upgrade theatrical lighting to LED to improve efficiency and reduce heat load.

C. RENOVATE, UPGRADE AND IMPROVE CLASSROOMS, LABS, LEARNING SPACES AND TECHNOLOGY

- Construct, furnish and equip flexible classrooms, learning studios, innovation centers, performance spaces, collaboration spaces, and maker spaces for STEAM, art, robotics, auto shop, technology, computer lab, broadcast media, music, and drama at all comprehensive high schools;
- Provide additional shade structures to offer outdoor learning, gathering, and dining spaces;
- Upgrade, remodel, expand, repurpose, install, construct, modernize, reconfigure, or relocate food service facilities and dining spaces, including related equipment and/or appliances.

- Modernize physical education classrooms, weight rooms, and storage; refurbish swimming pools and add cogeneration systems to improve safety and energy efficiency; replace grass fields and existing synthetic turf fields with all-weather synthetic turf to improve water efficiency, control run-off and extend playable hours; improve track and athletic facilities; add, resurface, and/or restripe hardcourts; add or repair existing playfields;
- Construct and/or improve, furnish and equip performing arts and music spaces and venues;
- Expand and modernize career-technical education classrooms, labs and equipment to prepare students for careers in fields like health science, engineering, technology and skilled trades;
- Construct and/or expand and upgrade buildings and rooms to support student health and wellness services and programs;
- Furnish and equip all classrooms and learning spaces.

Listed projects, repairs, improvements, rehabilitation projects and upgrades will be completed only as needed, and the listing of projects does not imply a particular prioritization among such improvements. Projects may be done in phases, based on Board of Trustees priorities available funding. Listed projects may be completed at any and all District schools, sites, properties (owned, leased or yet to be acquired) and education buildings where such project is determined necessary. Decisions regarding the scope, timing, prioritization or other facets of project implementation will be made solely by the Board of Trustees by subsequent action. Where terms such as “renovate,” “upgrade,” “replace” and “improve” are used in the Bond Project List, the Board of Trustees has the discretion to determine the best method for accomplishing the project’s objective, including the use of new construction. For any listed project involving renovation or modernization of a building or the major portion of a building, the District may proceed with new replacement construction instead (including any necessary demolition), if the District determines that replacement and new construction is more practical than renovation, considering the building’s age, condition, expected remaining life, comparative cost and other relevant factors. In addition, where feasible, projects may be completed in partnership with other public or private agencies on a joint use basis using bond proceeds, subject to federal tax rules and regulations.

Each project is assumed to include its share of costs of bond issuance, architectural, engineering, legal and similar planning costs; litigation costs; construction management; bond project consultants; staff development and training expenses associated with learning construction techniques and approaches and new bond-funded equipment and systems; the furnishing and equipping of all projects, including equipment to maintain facilities in a safe and clean condition; and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. Payment of the costs of preparation of facilities planning and project implementation studies, feasibility and assessment reviews, master planning, environmental studies, permit and inspection fees, Division of State Architect (DSA) - related requirements, studies and assessments, including ADA and seismic, and temporary

housing and relocation costs for dislocated programs or activities caused or necessitated by projects on the Bond Project List are permissible bond expenditures.

The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Necessary site preparation, grading or restoration may occur in connection with acquisition of property, new construction, modernization, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of modular classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads and acquiring any necessary easements, leases, licenses or rights of way to the property.

SECTION IV: ADDITIONAL SPECIFICATIONS

No Operating Expenses. Proceeds from the sale of Bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of school facilities on the Bond Project List, including the furnishing and equipping of said school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for said school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher or administrator salaries and other school operating expenses in accordance with applicable law.

Single Purpose. All of the purposes enumerated in this proposition shall be united and voted upon as one single proposition, pursuant to Section 15100 of the California Education Code, and all the enumerated purposes shall constitute the specific single purpose of the bonds and proceeds of the bonds shall be spent only for such purpose.

Other Terms of the Bonds. The bonds may be issued and sold in several series, and in accordance with a financing plan determined by the Board of Education pursuant to requirements of law. When sold, the bonds shall bear interest at an annual rate not exceeding the statutory maximum and with a maximum term not exceeding the statutory maximum, provided that the average useful life of bonds sold will not exceed one hundred twenty percent (120%) of the average life of the projects being financed or as otherwise provided by federal tax law. Bond funds may be used to reimburse the District for Bond Project list expenditures incurred prior to the election and bond issuance, in accordance with federal tax law.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the financial information contained in this measure is based upon the District’s projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District, nor are the summary or average payment estimates, if any, provided in the Ballot Label. The actual tax rates, debt service and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on need for construction funds and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each

sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

In preparing this information, the District obtained reasonable and informed projections of assessed property valuations that took into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made by the County Assessor, if any, in accordance with Education Code Section 15100(c).

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE F

After 17 years and \$52 million dollars – the County has provided no flood mitigation to San Anselmo. It’s time we end this waste by voting “Yes on F.”

Under the structure of Flood Zone 9 San Anselmo residents have no control over the decisions the County makes or how our money is spent. For 17 years the County Flood District hasn’t listened to us.

To be heard, in 2015 residents had to use the public ballot process to protect Memorial Park from more County waste and exploitation. A majority of San Anselmo residents voted to stop the Memorial Park detention basin and protect our beloved park.

Now residents need to protect Creek Park Plaza from destruction. The County’s claim that the plaza is unsafe and should be demolished is false.

The Town of San Anselmo hired an expert engineer who found that Creek Park Plaza isn’t dangerous and can be adequately reinforced for generations of use. The San Anselmo Town Council has set aside the money necessary to protect our Plaza.

FEMA regulations require that neighbors not be harmed by flood projects without adequate compensation and mitigation. If the County removes Creek Park Plaza without protecting our neighbors, it will violate FEMA regulations. Whether or not a “baffle” is installed, San Anselmo will be exposed to liability, our neighbors will suffer, and we’ll lose Creek Park Plaza, the heart of our town.

A “Yes on F” vote will not impact flood insurance availability or price.

Withdrawing from FZ9 will ensure we take on no additional financial liability for ineffective County projects and deliver a strong message to the County to leave Creek Park Plaza alone.

**IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS BY TOWN ATTORNEY
WITHDRAWAL OF SAN ANSELMO FROM FLOOD
DISTRICT INITIATIVE**

MEASURE F

INTRODUCTION: This measure was placed on the ballot by an initiative petition signed by the requisite number of voters. If approved by a majority of voters of the Town of San Anselmo (“Town”) voting on the question, the measure will withdraw all land in the Town from the Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District (“District”).

BACKGROUND: The State Legislature created the District in 1953 to control flood and storm waters and to conserve water for use when practicable. The Town withdrew from the District in 1971, before rejoining in 2006. In 2007 the District imposed a storm drainage fee on property in the Ross Valley, which the District designated as Zone 9, including the Town (hereinafter “Flood Fee”). The Flood Fee expires on June 30, 2027.

THE MEASURE: Under State law, a majority of Town voters voting on the measure can approve the Town’s withdrawal from the District. State law specifies that withdrawal will not release land so withdrawn from the duty to pay fees to fund debts and obligations the District becomes responsible for before the withdrawal. Accordingly, withdrawal from the District is unlikely to release property owners in the Town from having to pay the Flood Fee to fund projects to which the District is already committed. However, withdrawal can protect Town property owners from having to fund any projects the District initiates after withdrawal.

State law also provides that parcels of land withdrawn from the District remain subject to taxes for the maintenance of improvements constructed within the flood zone before the withdrawal. Maintenance of improvements within Flood Zone 9 is funded with a portion of the 1 percent property tax collected on properties in Town under Proposition 13. This property tax will continue to be collected and a portion will continue to be allocated to maintenance of improvements in Flood Zone 9, regardless of the Town’s withdrawal from the District. The Town’s presence in, or withdrawal from, the District will not affect the amount of the 1 percent property tax, but may affect distribution of tax proceeds to the agencies which benefit from it.

THE VOTE: A “Yes” vote is a vote in favor of the Town’s withdrawal from the District. A “No” vote is a vote against withdrawal from the District. This measure will be approved if it receives a majority of “Yes” votes.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authority provided by the California Elections Code, a petition has been filed with the Town Council of the Town of San Anselmo seeking voter approval for an initiative measure which would withdraw the Town of San Anselmo from Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District Flood Control Zone 9 (“Initiative”); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Elections Code section 9215, an initiative petition must be on file with the Town in valid form and signed by not less than 10% of the registered voters of the Town in order to qualify the initiative for the ballot; and

WHEREAS, according to Marin County voter records, the minimum number of signatures required to qualify the Initiative for the ballot is 952 registered Town voters; and

WHEREAS, the Town Clerk has certified that the form of the Initiative petition complies with California law and, based upon an examination of voter registration records by the Marin County Registrar of Voters, has ascertained that the petition is signed by the requisite number of voters to qualify the Initiative for the ballot; and

WHEREAS, at its November 14, 2023, meeting, the Town Council ordered a report pursuant to Elections Code section 9212 to evaluate the effects of the Initiative on the Town and its residents and staff prepared and presented the report to the Town Council at a special meeting on December 6, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council is authorized and required by California Elections Code sections 1405 and 9215 to submit the proposed Initiative to the voters at either the Town’s next regular election or at an earlier special election held not less than 88 days nor more than 103 days after the order of the election; and

WHEREAS, the next regular election is the Town’s General Municipal Election scheduled for November 5, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council desires to place the Initiative before the Town voters sooner than November 5, 2024, and the next available Special Election date that is not less than 88 days or more than 103 days from the date of this resolution is March 5, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the specific terms of the Initiative are attached hereto as Exhibit A and by this reference made an operative part hereof, and in accordance with all applicable law; and

WHEREAS, by adoption of this Resolution, the Town Council desires that the County of Marin render full services to the Town in connection with conducting the Special Municipal Election; and

WHEREAS, all necessary expenses in performing these services shall be paid by the Town of San Anselmo; and

WHEREAS, under California Elections Code section 10400 et seq., an election may be consolidated with other elections held on the same date; and

WHEREAS, it is also desirable to establish rules for submission of written arguments and rebuttals for and against the Initiative in accordance with the applicable California Elections Code procedures.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Town Council of the Town of San Anselmo hereby resolves as follows:

SECTION 1. Environmental Review

The Town Council finds that this resolution and the placement of the Initiative on the ballot is not a discretionary action of the Town Council within the meaning of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and therefore, not subject to CEQA review. (Tuolumne Jobs and Small Business Alliance v. Superior Court (2014) 59 Cal.4th 1029.)

SECTION 2. Recitals.

The Town Council hereby finds and determines that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein and by this reference are made an operative part hereof.

SECTION 3. Call of Special Municipal Election.

The Town Council hereby orders the Initiative attached hereto as Exhibit A to be submitted to qualified voters of the Town at a Special Municipal Election for the Town of San Anselmo to be held on the 5th day of March, 2024. The proposed Initiative shall be in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A and is incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 4. Ballot Question.

The Town Council, pursuant to its right and authority, does hereby order that the ballot question for the Initiative shall be presented and printed upon the ballot submitted to the qualified voters in the manner and form set forth in this Section. On the ballot to be submitted to the qualified voters at the Special Municipal Election to be held on March 5, 2024, in addition to any other matters required by law, there shall be printed the following ballot question:

“Shall an initiative measure be adopted to withdraw the Town of San Anselmo, including all parcels of land in Town, from the Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District Zone 9?”	Yes

SECTION 5. Request for Consolidation and Election Procedures.

The Town Council of the Town of San Anselmo hereby requests that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marin:

- (1) Consolidate the Town’s Special Municipal Election with any other applicable election conducted on March 5, 2024.
- (2) Pursuant to Elections Code section 10002, authorize and direct the County Registrar of Voters, at Town expense, to provide all necessary election services and to canvass the results of said election. The services shall be of the type normally performed by the Registrar of Voters in assisting the clerks of municipalities in the conduct of elections, including but not limited to checking registrations, mailing ballots, hiring election officers and arranging for polling places, receiving absentee voter ballot applications, mailing and receiving absentee voter ballots and opening and counting same, providing and distributing election supplies, and furnishing voting machines.
- (3) The Town Clerk of the Town of San Anselmo shall receive the canvass from the County as it pertains to the Special Municipal Election and shall certify the results to the Town Council, as required by law.

SECTION 6. Arguments and Impartial Analysis.

- (1) The Town Council authorizes the Town Council or any member(s) of the Town Council, the proponents of the Initiative, any individual voter eligible to vote on the Initiative, a bona fide association of such citizens or any combination of voters and associations, to file a written argument in favor of or against the Initiative, in accordance with Article 4, Chapter 3, Division 9 of the Elections Code. December 9, 2023, is the beginning of a ten-day period to file a primary written argument in favor of or against the Initiative. The primary arguments may be changed or withdrawn until and including December 18, 2023, after which no arguments for or against the Initiative may be submitted or withdrawn. Arguments in favor of or against the Initiative shall not exceed 300 words in length and must be filed with the Town Clerk and include the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the author(s) submitting it. Or, if the argument is submitted on behalf of an organization, the name of the organization and the printed name and signature of at least one of its principal officers who is the author of the argument.
- (2) Pursuant to Elections Code section 9285, rebuttal arguments to the primary arguments for or against the measure must be filed with the Town Clerk by no later than December 27, 2023 and must be 250 words or less, in accordance with state law.
- (3) The Town Clerk shall comply with all provisions of law establishing priority of arguments for printing and distribution to the voters and shall take all necessary actions to cause the selected arguments to be printed and distributed to voters.
- (4) Pursuant to Elections Code section 9280, the Town

Council directs the Town Clerk to transmit a copy of the Initiative to the Town Attorney. The Town Attorney shall prepare an impartial analysis for the Initiative in compliance with state law. The Impartial Analysis shall be filed by the deadline set for filing primary arguments as set forth above.

SECTION 7. Transmittal of Resolution.

The Town Clerk shall submit a certified copy of this resolution to the Board of Supervisors for the County of Marin.

SECTION 8. Severability.

If any provision of this Resolution or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Resolution which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Resolution are severable. The Town Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Resolution irrespective of the invalidity of any particular portion thereof.

SECTION 9. Effective Date of Resolution.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Be it Ordained by the People of the Town of San Anselmo:

SECTION I. TITLE

This measure shall be known and may be cited as the “Public Vote on the Subject of San Anselmo’s Withdrawal from Flood District Zone 9” (the “Initiative”).

SECTION II. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

A. Purposes. The purpose of the Initiative is to preserve and enable the rights of San Anselmo citizens to collectively control the decision of whether parcels within the Town of San Anselmo will be a part of Flood Zone 9. To accomplish this objective, the Initiative provides for a public vote on the subject of Withdrawal from Flood Zone 9 of Marin County California.

- 1. The Initiative provides the opportunity for citizens to

vote in accordance with Clause 68- 26.1 Withdrawal of Territory of the Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation Act of 1953, which states in part:

68-26.1. Withdrawal of territory

Notwithstanding any provisions of this act to the contrary, the withdrawal of all the area lying within the exterior boundaries of any chartered or incorporated city from the district may be effected by the vote of a majority of the qualified electors of said city voting at any regular or special election on the proposition to withdraw the area lying within such city from the district. Said election shall in all particulars be held as provided by law for holding a municipal election in said city and the cost thereof shall be a city charge.

The city council shall cause the results of the election to be certified to the board of supervisors of the district and if a majority of the votes cast on the proposition to withdraw such area from the district are in favor thereof, thereupon the area lying within the exterior boundaries of such city shall no longer be a part of the district; provided, however, that the withdrawal of the area lying within the exterior boundaries of such city from the district shall not release the area so withdrawn from debts and obligations for or upon which it was liable or chargeable at the time such withdrawal was made; provided further, however, that any portion of a city which prior to its withdrawal from the district was included within the Page 15 boundaries of a flood control zone shall remain subject to taxes for the maintenance of improvements constructed within such zone prior to the withdrawal of the city from the district.

B. Findings and Declarations: The people of the Town of San Anselmo hereby find and declare the following:

1. The Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District Zone 9 has failed to find feasible methods to significantly mitigate major flooding, property loss by floods, flood insurance obligations or disruption caused by major flooding events.
2. Based on a vote of a majority of qualified electors, the Town of San Anselmo hereby withdraws all parcels within the Town of San Anselmo from Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District Zone.

SECTION IV. FINDINGS OF CONSISTENCY.

A. This measure is consistent with and would promote the intent of the Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation Act of 1953.

B. The Initiative is not inconsistent with the General Plan, which does not require San Anselmo to Participate in Flood Zone 9.

SECTION V. CONFLICT WITH OTHER MEASURES.

This Initiative will be deemed to conflict with any other initiative appearing on the same ballot if the other initiative(s) address(es) any of the following subjects, whether it does so by specific application to, or as a more general enactment that could otherwise be applied to the subject: fiscal and legal responsibility applicable to any part of the Special Hazards Zone, as set forth in the Town’s Municipal Code, or in any other applicable Town law, policy or regulation. In the event

that this Initiative and any other initiative are approved by the voters at the same election, and this Initiative receives a greater number of affirmative votes than any other such measure or measures, this measure shall control in its entirety and the other measure or measures shall be rendered void and without any legal effect. If this Initiative is approved by a majority of the voters but does not receive a greater number of affirmative votes than any other conflicting initiative, this Initiative shall take effect to the extent permitted by law.

SECTION VI. EFFECTIVE DATE.

In accordance with the provisions of Elections Code section 9217, if a majority of the voters vote in favor of the Initiative, the Initiative shall go into effect 10 days after the vote is declared by the Town Council.

SECTION VII. INTERPRETATION AND SEVERABILITY.

This measure shall be interpreted so as to be consistent with applicable federal and state laws, rules and regulations. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this measure is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this measure. The voters hereby declare that this measure, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion hereof would have been adopted or passed even if one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases or portions are declared invalid or unconstitutional. If any portion of this measure is held invalid as applied to any person or circumstance, such invalidity shall not affect any application of this measure that can be given effect without the invalid application. This measure shall be broadly construed in order to achieve the purposes stated herein.

SECTION VIII. AMENDMENT OR REPEAL.

The provisions of this measure may be amended or repealed only by a majority of the voters of the Town voting in an election held in accordance with state law.

SECTION IX. IMPLEMENTATION.

A. Upon the effective date of this Initiative, The Town Council shall act in accordance with the provisions of The Marin County Flood Control and Water Conservation Act of 1953, including Clause 68-26.1 Withdrawal of Territory, and as otherwise required by the Act.

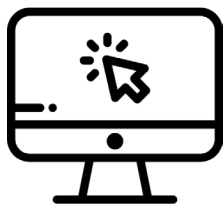

VOTER BILL of RIGHTS



YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS

1. **The right to vote if you are a registered voter.** You are eligible to vote if you are:

- ★ a U.S. citizen living in California
- ★ at least 18 years old
- ★ registered where you currently live
- ★ Not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony, and
- ★ not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court

2. **The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list.**

You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.

3. **The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.**

4. **The right to cast a secret ballot** without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.

5. **The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake,** if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:

Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot,
Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place, or
Vote using a provisional ballot.

6. **The right to get help casting your ballot** from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.

7. **The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place** in California.

8. **The right to get election materials in a language other than English** if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.


9. **The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures** and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.

10. **The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity** to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.

SPECIAL NOTICE

- Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on the day indicated in the posted county Voter Information Guide.
- Specific instructions on how to vote, including how to cast a provisional ballot, can be obtained from a poll worker or by reading the information mailed to you by your local elections official.
- If you are a newly registered voter, you may be asked to provide appropriate identification or other documentation according to federal law. But please note that every individual has the right to cast a provisional ballot even if he or she does not provide the documentation.
- It is against the law to represent yourself as being eligible to vote unless you meet all of the requirements to vote under federal and state law.
- It is against the law to tamper with voting equipment.

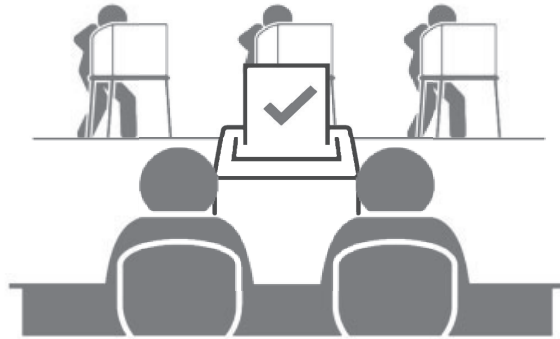

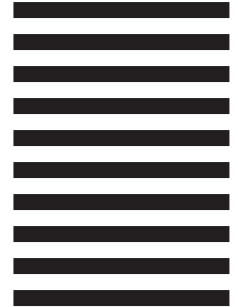
