SurfWorks is a free summer camp that teaches underprivileged youth how to surf and take care of the environment. We strive to spread an appreciation, awareness, and love of the ocean to kids who normally would not have the opportunity. Through surfing, we foster a love for the ocean and through educational activities and lessons, we teach the children their potential in helping create environmental sustainability in their community. Our main goal is for the campers to leave SurfWorks with a purpose to help the environment, a new love for the ocean, and the confidence that despite their socioeconomic status, they are a vital part in helping reverse climate change. Ultimately, we work to foster stewardship of the ocean and the environment. The ocean belongs to all of us and through this program we want to share it and protect it for future generations. As mentioned above, Surfworks is an all volunteer organization, so we don't have any labor costs. We do have expenses which I mention below. Our main goal is for the campers to leave SurfWorks with a purpose to help the environment, a new love for the ocean, and the confidence that despite their socioeconomic status, they are a vital part in helping reverse climate change. SurfWorks is in it's 7th year. It was created by four high school students that wanted to spread their love for surfing and the environment to youth that would not otherwise have the opportunity. It has continued to be run by high school students and has been incredibly successful. Every year we have a waitlist of students that want to participate. We also usually have a waitlist for the volunteers! We have been written up in the Marin IJ twice and have partnered with Surfrider, Parkside cafe, and LiveWater surf shop to create a meaningful and fun experience for these students. A large part of our expenses is the Van transportation of the students to and from Novato, San Rafael, and Stinson Beach. In addition, we need funds to purchase wetsuits and additional boards this year as renting them from a surf shop has become unsustainable. We spend some money on creating environmental curriculum and games that will have a lasting effect on the campers. In addition, we purchase camp shirts that are used over their wetsuits as they provide us with the ability to know at all times who the campers and the counselors are. The students love the shirts. We also purchase snacks, create photos and other take home reminders for the students and counselors. Parkside cafe for the last 7 years has provided free lunch for every student and every counselor, every day during our program.

List of all community interests that will be affected by the proposed project/program and the public benefit to be derived from it:

The community would be positively affected by our proposed project because we are teaching our future generation to take action and create an environmentally sustainable community. By running SurfWorks, we are benefitting the campers, the leaders, the environment, Marin County, and future generations. When the campers leave SurfWorks, our hope is that they are inspired to help reverse climate change, starting with themselves and ultimately in the

larger community. With the tools we teach them during camp, we equip campers with ideas to help reduce their individual and family carbon footprint. Because most of these kids come from either Hamilton, San Pedro, or Bahia Vista, we also hope to improve those schools by educating their students on environmental issues and encouraging them to apply and share what they have learned at camp to their home and school. In addition, the students in our camp are from low socioeconomic families and are almost always unable to participate in camps like this. We are giving these kids the opportunity to enjoy and learn about the ocean. They leave the camp feeling more confident in themselves and excited to try new things. Once a week we do a beach clean up at Stinson Beach. On average, we collect around 15 full bags in one day. The campers often see the mass amount of trash we collect and are shocked that the beach could contain that much trash. It helps them see the effect humans have on the environment, their ability to help, and the extremity of pollution and climate change. Lastly, every student is paired with a Marin County Highschool volunteer counselor. That counselor is with the student all week. Our campers thrive from this one on one attention from some these older students. Our counselors also benefit from participating and often leave feeling very grateful for the time spent with a younger child that hasn't had all of the privileges that they have.
