Dear Judge Simmons and Mr. Mann:

Attached to this letter is the response from the Larkspur-Corte Madera School District to the findings and recommendations of the Marin County Civil Grand Jury's report "*Marin Public Schools Fail to Beat Bullies.*" Similar to other Grand Jury Reports, this report also raises an issue related to the health and safety of all students in our schools. As with prior reports of Grand Juries over the years, these investigations have resulted in improvements in policies and procedures in our school district.

Consistent with the Grand Jury's report, our District is aware of and has done much to address the issue of bullying. This issue is one that impacts the entire community and, as such, any action should involve community partners. The Larkspur-Corte Madera School District stands ready to respond in such a manner to ensure that all students feel safe and comfortable in schools and beyond.

The attached responses will reflect that our highest priority is for all students to feel safe at school. The good news is that a vast majority of students, according to the 2013-2014 "*California Healthy Kids Survey: Marin County Secondary Main Report,*" reported feeling "safe or very safe" at school. Similarly, the vast majority of students in LCMSD report feeling safe at school according to the HKS 2015-2016 survey results. We also acknowledge that if one student does not feel safe, that is one too many.

We will report back to the Marin County Civil Grand Jury on additional steps that have been implemented or planned in December, 2016. Again, thank you for being our partner in supporting the safety of the students in our schools.

**Responses to the 2015-16 Marin County Civil Grand Jury Report  
"Marin Public Schools Fail To Beat Bullies"**

**Responses from the Larkspur-Corte Madera School District**

**FINDINGS**

**F1:** Bullying is a problem in Marin middle and high schools. Marin ranked above the State average overall in incidents for the 2011-13 school years and for two of the three grade levels surveyed in California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS).

**Response: Agree**

**F2:** Marin County schools do not fully comply with California anti-bullying law.

**Response: Partially disagree. Assuming the factual statements set forth in the Grand Jury's report are accurate, there may be some schools that need to update their policies in accordance with the law.**

**However, we can confirm that the schools within the Larkspur-Corte Madera School District are in compliance. All of our schools prioritize student safety and are trained to respond to bullying incidents in accordance with the law.**

**F3:** Most schools do not have a direct link on their website home page to their anti-bullying policies and procedures.

**Response: Agree**

**RECOMMENDATIONS**

**R1:** Each school in the District should review its policies and procedures to ensure full compliance with the requirements of Seth's Law.

**Response: The recommendation has been implemented related to the Larkspur-Corte Madera School District-operated programs and policies. Internal staff and legal review has verified compliance with the law.**

**R2:** Each school in the District should review its policies and procedures to ensure that complainants are protected from retaliation and that their identities remain confidential as appropriate.

**Response: The recommendation has been implemented related to the Larkspur-Corte Madera School District-operated programs and policies. Internal staff and legal review has verified compliance with the law.**

**R3:** Each school in the District should adequately publicize its anti-bullying policies and procedures through its website, including a direct link on the website's home page to

the information (not simply linking to a lengthy student handbook, but directly to the anti-bullying policy and procedures themselves).

**Response: The recommendation has been implemented by Larkspur-Corte Madera School District.**

**R4:** All procedures and forms for filing a bullying complaint, including an anonymous complaint, should be available on the school's website.

**Response: The recommendation has been implemented by Larkspur-Corte Madera School District.**

**R5:** Each school in the District's website should provide the option to complete and submit bullying complaints online.

**Response: The recommendation has been implemented by Larkspur-Corte Madera School District.**

**R6:** Each school in the District should review its student and parent education programs to ensure they are relevant and current. Schools should consider using the *No Bully Solution Team* process that has been reported to be highly successful, or another equivalent program.

**Response: The recommendation has been implemented. The Larkspur-Corte Madera School District publicized trainings offered countywide by the Marin County Office of Education in collaboration with community partner organizations, agencies, and individuals including No Bully® to prevent and respond to bullying and harassment.**

**The District will provide a booster training in No Bully this fall at the middle school. Elementary programs use Second Step, Responsive Classrooms, and Mindful Classroom approaches to teach students about anti-bullying approaches. The District publicizes and**

**encourages staff participation in countywide professional development for educators. In addition, the District publicizes parent information and training workshops that are held several times a year by community partners dealing with topics such as teen sexting, digital abuse, student mental health, online behavior, best practices for serving transgender students, Marin Teen Girl Conference, and other issues related to the safety of our students.**
