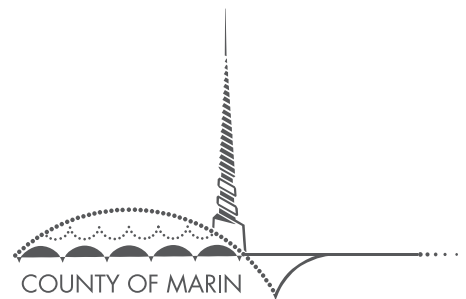


MARIN AT A GLANCE

2015





For the sixth consecutive year, Marin was ranked the healthiest county in California having the lowest percent of uninsured adults, unemployment, and teen birth rate.

The Board of Supervisors supported legislation that eliminated most exemptions that allowed parents to avoid vaccinations for their children.

Health and Human Services enrolled over 35,000 people in health care coverage under the Affordable Care Act.

The Board of Supervisors increased the County's 2015 living wage rate from \$12.10 to \$13.00 per hour.

The Board of Supervisors banned tobacco sales in pharmacies located in unincorporated areas.

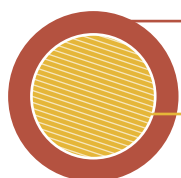

SAFE COMMUNITIES

More than 800 toy guns and violent video games turned in as a result of an exchange program sponsored by the District Attorney.

High-tech, remote cameras installed on four peaks to aid the Fire Department in early wildfire detection efforts.

The Sheriff's Communication Center dispatched over 44,000 9-1-1 calls from its new state-of-the-art dispatch center located within the seismically-safe Marin Emergency Operation Center.

Department of Public Works began working on the new 9-1-1 system managed by the Marin Emergency Radio Authority and used by all local fire and law enforcement agencies.

12,500 Marin residents registered their mobile phone numbers on www.alertmarin.org to receive texted notifications during emergencies.



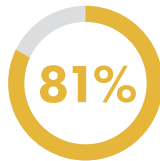

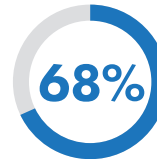

ENVIRONMENTAL PRESERVATION

More than a quarter of Marin residents purchased electrical power generated from renewable sources, one of the highest percentages in the country.

Marin County Parks opened the Stafford Lake Bike Park, the first public bike park in the North Bay, featuring a range of features for all ages and abilities.

More than 1,200 primary school students participated in the 31st Farm Day that gives urban youth the opportunity to learn about agriculture in Marin.

Nearly \$6 million in funding from Measure A parcel tax resulted in property acquisitions, visitor service enhancements, facility improvements and park renovations in 19 local jurisdictions. Including:

- ✓ Purchase of 16.2-acre Sky Ranch (now part of the Bald Hill Open Space Preserve)
- ✓ Share the Path safety campaign at the Mill Valley/Sausalito Multiuse Pathway
- ✓ Bridge replacements at Roy's Redwoods, Cascade Canyon, and Baltimore Canyon preserves
- ✓ Mt. Tam field renovation at McInnis Park
- ✓ Cascade fountain renovation at Lagoon Park
- ✓ Illegal trails in open space district lands were restored
- ✓ Park fees reduced

SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES

The State certified Marin’s 2015–2023 Housing Element, a comprehensive plan for future housing, making the County eligible for funds that serve local transportation needs.


AB 1537 recognized Marin as “suburban” rather than “metropolitan,” which lowered the default density of future housing developments from 30 units per acre to 20 units.

Staff helped secure the purchase and sale of a Forest Knolls mobile home park to preserve it as a 20-unit affordable housing.

With a building code amendment, “green-minded” contractors gained more freedom to embark on sustainability sensitive building projects.


Innovative financing helped Marin property owners afford home energy and water efficiency projects along with renewable energy investments through property taxes.

The County launched marincounty.org/openbudget to provide residents interactive online access to the County's budget.

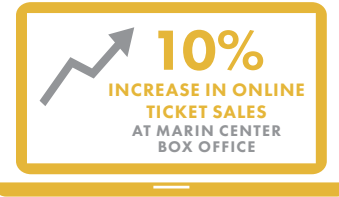
The Marin County Free Library dedicated \$1.5 million to create a "school community" in the Hamilton area of Novato to replace the South Novato Library branch.
