Marin Stream Ordinance



Myth

This is a new regulation that the County is trying to rush through.



- SCA Ordinance is based on existing policies.
- SCA applies through Design Review, variances, native tree ordinance already.
- Ordinance expands scope of regulation to patios, driveways, veg. removal that don't currently require permits.

Myth

The SCA means I can't use or make improvements on my property. It is a takings.



- This regulation does not prevent use of property.
- The SCA is a special permit area. Permit applications are viewed in light of avoiding or mitigating riparian impacts.
- Most common home improvements are exempt or require a Tier 1 (administrative) permit.

Myth

The County is using the SCA to make homeowners remove their unpermitted structures.



- The ordinance will not change the County's code enforcement program.
- If a complaint results in a County investigation that confirms the presence of non-permitted construction, homeowners have the option to obtain permits to legalize the work.

Myth

The SCA ordinance will add time and cost to permitting for my project.



- The SCA doesn't add time or cost for exempt projects, even if they require other permits.
- SCA permits can tracked with other permits (like building permits).
- Other existing costs, like
 Design Review, are offset.

Myth

The SCA does not apply to my property. There are no fish and it is dry most of the year.



- The SCA is about more than fish: stream channels, water quality, flood control, stream habitat (including fish), riparian habitat.
- Decisions about site development and vegetation can affect your stream segment as well as downstream areas.







- Implement through established permit processes, new ordinances, "development permits"

Current Countywide Plan Policies



2007: Stream Conservation Areas

- Build upon previous CWP policies.
- 20' SCA setback on parcels < 0.5 acres in City-Centered Corridor.
- Site assessment required for development application in SCA.
- Standards of compliance:
 - Hydraulic capacity
 - Habitat acreage, value, function
 - Water quality
- Implementing programs

Stream Setbacks are Common

Fairfax, Mill Valley, Novato, Ross, San Rafael, Sausalito, Tiburon

- Applicability varies (permit type)
- Distance varies, 20' -100'

Napa, Sonoma, Santa Cruz Counties

- Applicable to discretionary and ministerial
- Distance varies, 10' (arroyos) 200' (Russian River)



Fishnet 4C Program

- Six County effort coordinating with State and Federal agencies
- Salmon stream road crossings inventoried and prioritized for fish passage
- Grant support for fish passage and habitat restoration
- Developed road maintenance standards for protection of fish habitat
- Commitments by County Parks, Fire, and MMWD to implement best practices for road and trail maintenance
- Commitment by County Parks, Public Works, and MMWD to preserve large wood for fish habitat
- Staff training to support these efforts

- ✓ With state grant funding repaired 84 erosion sites and more than eight miles of roads and trail.







Marin County Parks Habitat Restoration Program (2007-2013)










SCA Permit Procedures

Development:

All structures, vegetation removal, deposition of refuse or other activities with potential adverse impacts to hydraulic capacity, habitat acreage/value/function, or water quality


Exemptions

New development and some previously exempt require permit if it occurs in SCA!


